



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

Since joining CDU in 2021, Professor Bowman has delivered a new strategic plan outlining ambitions for CDU to become Australia's most connected university.

Professor Bowman has put renewed focus on CDU's regional campuses, appointing senior

leaders in Alice Springs, Nhulunbuy, Katherine, and Sydney. He has led a restructuring of the University and the establishment of CDU TAFE, a dedicated area for skills and training designed to meet future workplace needs.

Professor Bowman began his professional life as a radiographer, working in several London hospitals before starting his teaching and lecturing career. He left the UK for Australia to take the position of Head of the School of Clinical Sciences at Charles Sturt University and holds a Master of Politics and Government, a Ph.D. in Clinical Decision Making, and a Master of Business Administration.

Professor Bowman joined CDU as a distinguished university leader, having served as Vice-Chancellor and President of CQUniversity (CQU). For over a decade, his vision and leadership helped transform CQU into one of Australia's largest and most engaged regional universities.

Professor Bowman also served at Western Sydney University as a Senior Deputy Vice-Chancellor. Other previous university leadership positions include Deputy Vice-Chancellor (University Services) and Registrar at James Cook University; Foundation Head of the School of Clinical Sciences at Charles Sturt University; and Foundation Dean of the Faculty of Health Science and Community at the University College of St Martin (Lancaster University) Lancaster, UK.

In 2019, he was appointed as an Officer of the Order of Australia (AO) for his significant contributions to higher education, training, and regional Australia.

Gibson is Deputy Chair of Tiwi Plantations Corporation. He was born in Milikapiti on Melville Island, educated in Darwin and Mackay (QLD), and began working in forestry at the age of 17. Previously Gibson served as Chair of the Tiwi Land Council for 11 years.

What began as documenting spearfishing adventures has evolved into an impactful organisation. Dennis champions ethical practices by collaborating with Indigenous artists and supporting communities through workshops and mentoring. He also leads the Marine Debris Taskforce, removing tonnes of waste from Torres Strait beaches and training locals in drone technology. An aviation firefighter and entrepreneur, Dennis fuses culture, sustainability, and innovation to empower change.

PROFESSOR BARNEY GLOVER, AO Commissioner, Jobs and Skills Australia

Professor Barney Glover AO began his five-year term as Commissioner of Jobs and

Skills Australia in 2024.

Professor Glover is a distinguished academic leader, an accomplished mathematician and mathematics educator with significant experience in developing strong relationships with the vocational education sector. He is well respected for his engagement with First Nations Australians and disadvantaged communities.

He was Vice-Chancellor and President of Western Sydney University for ten years, from 2014-24, and in 2019 was appointed an Officer of the Order of Australia for distinguished service to tertiary education, professional associations and cultural organisations. In 2015, Professor Glover was awarded the title of Emeritus Professor for his outstanding leadership whilst Vice-Chancellor of Charles Darwin University from 2009 to 2013. Professor Glover was awarded the title of Emeritus Professor and an Honorary Doctorate of Letters from Western Sydney University in 2024 in recognition of his decade of leadership.

Professor Glover has served on the boards of a diverse range of corporate organisations and several state and national centres covering areas such as health and medical research, energy, mineral exploration, and telecommunications.

HIS EXCELLENCY, MINISTER AIRLANGGA HARTARTO Coordinating Minister for Economic Affairs of Indonesia

Airlangga was born on October 1, 1962, and grew up in a family close to Indonesian politics,

Airlangga assumed the Coordinating Minister for Economic Affairs role in 2019 under President Joko Widodo and continues until the leadership of President Prabowo Subianto. Previously, he led the Ministry of Industry from 2016 to 2019.

Airlangga graduated from University of Gadjah Mada in 1987 with Bachelor of Mechanical Engineering. In 1996, Airlangga obtain Master of Management Technology from The University of Melbourne and later on also graduated from Monash University Melbourne with Master of Business Administration in 1997. With a very comprehensive background of experience as a businessman, legislator, and minister, The Korea Development Institute (KDI) School of Public Policy awarded Doctor Honoris Causa in the field of Development Policy to Airlangga in 2019.

As a Coordinating Minister for Economic Affairs, Airlangga led the Committee for Handling COVID-19 and National Economic Recovery (KPCPEN) to navigate Indonesia out of the COVID-19 outbreak by implementing various strategic steps, integrating the aspects of health management with the national economic recovery.

During Indonesia's G20 Presidency in 2022, Airlangga led the G20 Sherpa Track. In 2023, Airlangga was also at the forefront, leading the ASEAN process under Indonesia's chairmanship, which focused on three main aspects: building regional growth, promoting the digital economy, and supporting sustainable development.

Airlangga continues to lead Indonesia's active participation in various international forums to strengthen Indonesia's position in the global economy and realise inclusive and sustainable national economic growth.




